Content Questions

- How did Norwegians pass the tradition of lefse making down? How did this reflect their culture from Norway?
- How do cooking tools reflect a group of people?
- How does the food we eat reflect our culture and communities?

Educational Goal Assessment

- Summarize how we use food to celebrate cultures.
- Explain how food represents culture.
- Identify how cooking tools changed over time.
- Examine how foods from different ethnicities are similar.

Suggested Performance Task

- Activity #1, Cooking Tool Time Line
 - Look at the images and write down which item was made first, made second, what was made third, and what we use now. There are three categories of cooking objects, the oven, coffee maker, and freezer. (See handout and attached PDF)
- Activity #2, What Can I Eat with This
 - Assign groups or individuals a food and have them make a list of different ways a food is eaten. With each food indicate how you eat it. Make a list of foods you eat it with and write down why you think these foods are eaten together. (See handout below)
- Activity #3, Why Do We Cook?
 - Using the handout below have student think about and write a paragraph about why they cook or do not cook.
